We are deeply saddened and appalled by the violent events that transpired in Hull and other towns and cities over the weekend. We stand with all our colleagues at NHS Humber and North Yorkshire Integrated Care Board in condemning these acts of violence, racism and vandalism in the strongest possible terms.

Our commitment to fostering an inclusive environment for all remains unwavering. Violence and discrimination have no place in our society, and we will continue to work tirelessly to ensure that everyone feels safe, respected, and valued.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to our dedicated colleagues in the NHS who worked diligently over the weekend. Your professionalism and dedication in the face of such challenging circumstances are deeply appreciated. We are also immensely grateful to our partners, Humberside Police, Humberside Fire and Rescue Service, Hull City Council and many others for their swift and effective response to the Hull incident and to members of the community who supported the clean-up operation.

To our colleagues, patients, and the public who were impacted, whether directly or indirectly, we offer our deepest empathy. We understand the distress and fear that such events can cause, and reiterate that acts of racism, abuse and violence will not be tolerated towards any NHS colleagues.

We urge everyone in our community to come together and reaffirm our shared commitment to peace, inclusivity, and mutual respect. Together, we can overcome the challenges we face and build a stronger, more harmonious community for all.

NHS urges public to come forward for care during GP collective action

The NHS is asking people to still come forward as usual for care during collective action by GP practices.

GP services across England were given a mandate to begin collective action on Thursday 1 August for an indefinite period of time. There may be some disruption to services, though practices will remain open as usual and patients can make requests by phone, online or by walking in.

During collective action, practices are still required to be open between 8am and 6:30pm Monday to Friday.

It is vital that patients still attend their appointments unless they are told otherwise, and practices should inform you of any changes to services. The nature of the action means that the impacts will vary at different GP practices and from area to area but could include GPs limiting the number of patient appointments per day.

NHS teams have worked hard to plan for disruption and to mitigate this where possible to ensure services continued to be provided for patients.

Maternity Support Workers celebrated at prestigious Nursing and Midwifery Conference



The Maternity Support Worker qualification was designed and developed by professionals and clinicians across Humber and North Yorkshire to meet the needs of the local maternity workforce.

The first course at the University of Hull commenced in September 2023 and was purposely designed to empower MSWs. These dedicated individuals have undergone extensive education, paired with hands-on experience which will equip them with the skills necessary to provide exceptional support to midwives and healthcare teams, as well as compassionate care to mothers and their newborn babies.

A family fun day is being organised to celebrate 40 years of the York Special Care Baby Unit (SCBU) Support Group, which everyone is welcome to come along to.

The day, to be held next month at Osbaldwick Sports Club, is being hosted by volunteers who have been supporting families with premature babies since the 1980s.

The group financially supports a wide range of services during hospital stays and again once mum and baby are allowed home for neonatal care. This can even include funding to help with the cost of living and overnight stays for families.

Staff who have worked on the unit and continue to do so are members of the group, which regularly holds events across the city to raise funds. Money is used to pay for a variety of specialist equipment, from incubators to heated mattresses, for premature babies.

Launched in June 2019, AAC is an award-winning service prescribing exercise, health and wellbeing to all cancer patients within HDFT as part of the standard cancer care pathways.

Since the service opened, AAC has treated over 3,500 patients and has around 1,200 patient visits per month.

Text support service

The confidential staff support text service known as FRONTLINE can be accessed by texting **SHOUT to 85258**. Mental Health Innovations will continue to provide the service which is available to all NHS colleagues.

From **Tuesday 13 August 2024**, any colleague texting FRONTLINE will receive an

automated response to text SHOUT, where they will be supported by a trained volunteer overseen by clinical supervisors.

Further support available for our NHS staff:

In line with the Urgent and Emergency Care Recovery Plan 2023, Integrated Care Systems have launched or are in the process of launching 24/7 mental health helplines and text services.

These services aim to provide immediate support for mental health crises and improve access to care. For example, those in mental health crisis can now also access 24/7 local support via NHS111 by selecting mental health 'option 2'.

It is important that you continue signposting your local packages of support for staff and promote these locally, including occupational health and wellbeing services and Employee Assistance Programmes (EAP). To compliment this, the national health and wellbeing programme is focused on improving the health and wellbeing of our NHS people by:

- Growing our Occupational Health and Wellbeing services and people, as an integral part of an effective, preventative health and wellbeing management system, through the 5-year '[Growing Occupational Health and Wellbeing Together](#)' strategy.
- Empowering organisations to adopt a preventative approach to Violence Prevention & Reduction embedded in organisational culture supported by effective, evidence-based interventions.

Harrogate End of Life Planning and Support Service



Harrogate End of Life Planning and Support Service (HELPSS) is for people who are living with a palliative diagnosis and may be approaching the last year of life. It aims to support patients to get the type of care that they want, at the time it is needed and in the place that is preferred.

What is HELPSS?

The [Harrogate End of Life Planning and Support Service \(HELPSS\)](#) is being led by the Harrogate and District NHS Foundation Trust, in partnership with Saint Michael's

Hospice, Airedale NHS Foundation Trust, Macmillan Cancer Support and Social Finance.

HELPSS will:

- Improve identification of patients who may be in the last year of life in the Harrogate locality.
- Improve access to advance/future care planning for those with a palliative diagnosis who may be in the last year of life.
- Provide access to Goldline, a 24/7 telephone service for patients who may be in the last year of life and their carers

These initiatives will ensure that patients who may be in the last year of life in Harrogate are proactively identified and can access the support they need.

Saint Michael's Hospice will provide the service to improve access to, and recording of [high-quality advance/future care plans](#) including treatment escalation and emergency care plans.

Airedale NHS Foundation Trust will provide [the Goldline 24/7 telephone service](#), offering access to clinical help, support and advice for patients who have been identified as approaching their last year of life and their carers.

[Macmillan Cancer Support](#), through its partnership with [Social Finance](#), has provided £2,636,000 of up-front funding for HELPSS. Social Finance specialises in social investment and has been working with Macmillan, through the Macmillan End of Life Care Fund, to find new and innovative ways to improve services supporting people at the end of their lives.

New support in Harrogate for people living with secondary breast cancer



Leading research and support charity, Breast Cancer Now, is launching a new service in Harrogate while working alongside Harrogate and District NHS Foundation Trust (HDFT) to support people living with secondary breast cancer.

The new 'Living with Secondary Breast Cancer' group will bring together people with secondary breast cancer to talk, listen and learn with others who understand the challenges that secondary breast cancer brings, in a relaxed and supportive environment.

Hull hospital trials video triage for stroke patients in East Yorkshire

Stroke patients in Hull and parts of East Yorkshire are to benefit from a new rapid assessment system aimed at saving lives and improving care.

Hull University Teaching Hospitals, part of NHS Humber Health Partnership, is introducing a Pre-Hospital Video Triage Scheme after securing some funding from NHS England on a trial basis.

Stroke Co-ordinators, supported by Stroke Services Consultants, will connect to Yorkshire Ambulance Service crews using video technology enabling visual checks and digital evaluation of patients.

Patients with a suspected stroke will be "blue-lighted" to Hull Royal Infirmary, straight into the care of the specialist stroke team for CT scans or to begin life-saving treatment such as mechanical thrombectomy to remove blockages from their arteries.

Humber and North Yorkshire Cancer Alliance announces Innovation Grant winners



An at-home chemotherapy service, a Vulvovaginal Atrophy and a project which uses virtual reality to reduce anxiety in young cancer patients are among the inaugural winners of Humber and North Yorkshire Cancer Alliance's Cancer Innovation Grants programme.

In April 2024, the Cancer Alliance launched its first-ever Cancer Innovation Grants programme, setting aside £400,000 to fund a wide variety of projects to improve early cancer detection or improve treatment or recovery for cancer patients in Humber and North Yorkshire.

Fast forward three months and the Cancer Innovation Grants, which were created in partnership with Health Innovation Yorkshire & Humber and NHS Humber and North Yorkshire Integrated Care Board, have proved particularly popular – with 47 applications received totalling a whopping £1.4million.

Call for pregnant women to get whooping cough jab

Pregnant women in Hull and East Yorkshire are being encouraged to get the whooping cough vaccination after a national rise in cases.

Newborns have to wait eight weeks until they can be immunised, so the local NHS trust is offering the jab at drop-in sessions at Hull Women and Children's Hospital.

The latest UKHSA figures for England show 2,427 cases in June, with a total of more

than 10,400 since January. Vaccination rates for pregnant women in the Humber and North Yorkshire stand at 73.2%, compared with the England average of 59.4%.

CHCP achieves outstanding patient and colleague survey results

City Health Care Partnership's (CHCP) annual patient and colleague surveys show a clear link between happy staff and happy patients.

76% of colleagues completed the survey on what it's like to work at CHCP, a local NHS organisation providing community health and care services in Hull and the East Riding. 91% said they would recommend CHCP to friends and family who needed care or treatment.

This is reflected in the annual patient survey, which asked 2,422 people about the service they'd received from CHCP last year. 93% said they were satisfied with their overall experience but even more striking was the 98% of patients who said they were treated with care and respect by their health professional; 96% said they were happy with the amount of time their clinician spent with them.

Historical images on show at York mental health hospital



Incredible pictures of objects not normally shown to the public are currently on show at Foss Park

The photos, taken by photography students from York St John's University, now adorn the walls of the mental health hospital Foss Park which is run by Tees Esk, and Wear Valleys NHS Foundation Trust (TEWV).

Subjects include 15th-century prayer books, illuminated manuscripts, and a road map of Yorkshire from 1675. They are all part of the Arts strategy at Foss Park which is led by Converge, a programme run by the university alongside mental health service providers like TEWV.

It aims to open up university life and all it can offer to people who, for a time in their lives, have experienced mental ill health.

Trust opens its new Community Hub

Harrogate and District NHS Foundations Trust's (HDFT) Community Hub based at Grove Park Court is now open and providing Podiatry, and Speech and Language community clinics to Harrogate residents.

The HDFT Community Hub now sees over 60 patients a day for Podiatry Services such as minor nail surgery, wound care and musculo-skeletal assessments. The Hub also provides speech and language services such as vocal assessment and management of communication or swallowing disorders.

The building was renovated to accommodate over 70 clinical staff, with a dedicated admin base for the Trust's District Nursing teams, six outpatient clinic rooms and an Orthotics Laboratory.

Innovative research project wins prestigious award

A pilot scheme which screens emergency department patients for infectious diseases has proven to be a huge success, testing more than 3,700 patients in its first seven months.

The James Cook University Hospital team (emergency department, pathology research team and virology lab) won a prestigious award at the British Association of Sexual Health and HIV (BASHH) conference for the initiative which involves testing for blood-borne viruses (BBV) and syphilis when people have any blood samples taken in the emergency department.

To date, 142 patients have tested positive for one of the infections allowing early

medical intervention. Most patients have been contacted and, where necessary, started treatment.
