Hundreds attend Patient Carer Forum training event



Virtual Masterclass: A Strategic Approach to Community-Centred Work



Tuesday 24 September 2024, 2:00-5:00pm

The relationship between organisations and communities worldwide is changing, and this change will require a fundamental shift in behaviours from both health managers, social care staff, social workers, the institutions they work in, and their interactions with residents in communities and neighbourhoods.

This stretching and refreshing online masterclass will draw on the concepts and approaches from Cormac Russell's books: *Rekindling Democracy: A Professional's Guide to Working in Citizen Space* & *The Connected Community* along with current and developing UK and international examples to facilitate a wide-ranging discussion on how best to put communities at the centre of change, including in the role of social work.

The workshop will give participants the opportunity to look at four fundamental questions for creating vibrant and resilient communities in keeping with the current strategies and policies of Local Authorities, NHS Providers, Commissioners, Health and Care partnerships, Not for Profit and Civil Society Partners:

- What can communities do that organisations cannot?

- What can communities do with organisations that neither can do alone?
- What can organisations do that the community cannot?
- How can we get these competencies and strengths better aligned?

In doing this, the session will focus on developing a strategic approach that will support individual practice to respond to these core questions and to identify practical applications to bring about change at micro, mezzo and macro levels.

Patient is honoured with D-Day medal at Malton Hospital



Ahead of Armed Forces Day on Saturday 29 June 2024, the Fitzwilliam Ward at Malton Hospital hosted one of their patients as he was presented with the Legion d'Honneur medal for his involvement in the D-Day landings.

At the age of 20, Sergeant George Jackson was among the first wave of soldiers landing on the beaches of Normandy with his Royal Engineers regiment and received this medal for his part in the liberation of France during the Second World War. Now aged 100, George is still able to remember the events 80 years ago, but did not speak about his experiences until 2014.

George was moved to have received this medal and insisted he stand to receive the honour from Brigadier General Armel Dirou of France's Armée de Terre. The National Order of the Legion of Honour was established in 1802, and is the highest military and civil decoration in France.

Video game created to help recruit to pharmacy roles

A new video game has been designed to help recruit the next generation of pharmacists to work in our hospitals.

Players have to do their best to look after four virtual patients, getting them the medication that they have been prescribed by the virtual doctor, so that they can go home - and it's all against the clock, just like a real hospital!

The idea was the brainchild of Rachel Craven, Pharmacy Business, Service and Performance Manager at Northern Lincolnshire and Goole NHS Foundation Trust, who wanted to find a way of inspiring more people to join the team.

After speaking to The Grimsby Institute, students on the BA Game Design course set about making Rachel's concept a reality. They worked for free over the course of 12 months and came up with the finished product – Pharmacy Rush.

Patients with blood conditions benefit from new service at Queen's Centre



Patients with serious blood conditions are avoiding invasive surgery and additional overnight stays in hospital after an innovative procedure was offered to more people in East Yorkshire.

Intravenous lines for patients requiring stem cell transplant following intensive chemotherapy are now being offered to haematology patients at Ward 33 and the Teenage and Young Adults Unit after its successful use in oncology patients at the Queen's Centre.

In the past 12 months, 32 haematology patients have undergone the procedure – known as PowerPICC Solo – avoiding the more invasive treatment performed in operating theatres while saving the NHS almost £50,000.

Northern Lincolnshire hospitals proposal to be considered



A revised proposal to change the way some hospital services are provided in northern Lincolnshire is to be considered by NHS Humber and North Yorkshire ICB this week (Wednesday 10 July).

Last year the local NHS set out how it would go about changing a small number of more complex medical, urgent and emergency care services in Scunthorpe and Grimsby to “meet the needs of patients across the region now and in the future, as well as tackling a range of challenges faced by the NHS in our region”.

Thousands of people took part in a 14-week public consultation, which received a “good practice” endorsement from The Consultation Institute.

Following the consultation, the local NHS has now made some changes to the proposal that was initially put forward, which the ICB Board is now being asked to consider.

Middlesbrough mum's unique friendship with nurse helps overcome alcohol addiction



A Middlesbrough mother is sharing a unique story of her friendship with a nurse who helped her find recovery from alcohol addiction.

Kathryn Hearn, 42, is leading a life as a senior rehab coach at Recovery Connections, a non-profit Lived Experience Recovery organisation based in Middlesbrough.

In her role, she supports individuals to overcome addiction to alcohol or substances whilst steering them towards a life of health and balance.

However, the mother-of-two's recovery from alcohol was never easy as her early life was filled with bumps and hardships.

"It started with a litre of cider with friends and going to pubs as a 16-year-old on a Friday night in Middlesbrough," she said.

But Kat's life as a 22-year-old took a sudden turn when she sadly lost her fiancé in a car accident.

This escalated her alcohol consumption as she started drinking heavily to cure her pain.



With a focus on tackling childhood obesity, improving mental and emotional resilience in young people, and reducing the prevalence of loneliness and social isolation in older people, projects are delivered day and night throughout the week by experienced wellbeing instructors utilising schools and accessible community venues.

KPOW! (Know the Power of Words)



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

Yorkshire and Humber Dental
Commissioning Report – 2023/24

In April 2023, responsibility for commissioning of NHS dental services transferred to Integrated Care Boards (ICBs) from NHS England, with staff transferring across from July 2023.

In Yorkshire and the Humber, the three ICBs have agreed to work together, with NHS Humber and North Yorkshire ICB hosting the Dental Commissioning Team, also working across NHS South Yorkshire ICB and NHS West Yorkshire ICB.

We have now produced an end-of-year report, providing a review of Dental Commissioning in Yorkshire and the Humber from 2023/2024.

The community engagement roadshow series, which consists of lots of different events across the Humber and North Yorkshire region, is being organised by Humber and North Yorkshire Cancer Alliance to:

- raise awareness and improve understanding of cancer
- gain greater insight into any barriers to presenting early with cancer symptoms and attending cancer screening
- gain a deeper understanding of people's experience of using cancer services

The roadshow will visit many of Humber and North Yorkshire's cities and towns, where Cancer Alliance staff and colleagues from various partners will engage in conversations with people who have been treated for cancer, or members of the public to understand their understanding of and attitudes towards the disease.

'Voices of the street' report completed by Healthwatch Hull

The latest report by Healthwatch Hull, funded by Yorkshire Ambulance Service Charity, explores the experiences of the homeless population when accessing ambulance services in Hull.

Over a period of 24 weeks, the Healthwatch listened to the views and experiences of 78 people within the homeless community, 70 members of staff from Yorkshire Ambulance Service (YAS), and 28 stakeholders from wider services to build up an in-depth picture of how the healthcare system works for this population.

This report highlights good practice across the service and makes a number of recommendations for commissioners and providers on areas where improvements could be made, both within the ambulance service and across the wider system.

New fund launched to tackle health inequalities in York



The VCSE Health Inequalities Small Grants Fund has been launched with £55k to distribute to charities, community groups, and non-profit organisations in York.

The funding, contributed by City of York Council Public Health and NHS Humber and North Yorkshire Integrated Care Board (ICB), aims to fund Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise (VCSE) sector organisations in York to deliver projects that reduce health inequalities through early intervention and prevention.

York CVS, a local support and development charity for the VCSE sector is administering the fund and is encouraging all community groups, clubs, charities, and other not-for-profit organisations in York, including small and newly established groups, to apply.

Projects must focus on supporting access and awareness of health services, improving people's experience of health/social care services, helping people to live more healthily and focusing on at least one of the clinical areas in the NHS CORE20PLUS, which includes: Maternity, Severe Mental Illness (SMI), Chronic Respiratory Disease, Early Cancer Diagnosis, and Hypertension.

Voluntary and Community Sector survey



HEY Smile Foundation is working in partnership with East Riding Public Health to conduct a survey on Inclusion Health and inviting all voluntary and community groups to complete.

National Cancer Patient Experience of Care Survey (CPES) results published

The 2023 National Cancer Patient Experience Survey (CPES) results have been published. It aims to understand people's experiences of cancer care, and the insight provided in the survey is used to improve the quality of NHS cancer services.

The survey asks a variety of questions to gauge people's experience of care, including how involved patients felt in decisions about their care, whether the information they were given was easy to understand, and whether they felt they had enough support from staff.

The 2023 CPES was completed by 1,930 patients in Humber and North Yorkshire, resulting in a 55% response rate. This compares favourably to the national response rate of 52% (63,438). The results yielded no scores above or below the expected range.

This means that the Cancer Alliance achieved scores for all questions expected by NHS England based on the size of our alliance and the demographics within the region.

NIHR Bursaries for Regulated Health & Care Professionals

Bursaries are available to pay the course fees for regulated Health and Care Professionals, except doctors and dentists.

The bursaries are part of a wider [HCP funding program](#) which has ten streams of work to develop careers within specific professions. Consequently, the bursaries are not available for some professions including doctors, dentists and clinical research practitioners.

This restriction applies only to bursary and not course applications; all professions are eligible to apply for a place on one of the courses.

'First of its kind' public health initiative begins at Hull Royal Infirmary

Patients and hospital staff in Hull are to be tested for a serious infection in a ground-breaking public health project believed to be the first of its kind in England.

Nurse specialists from the Blood-Borne Virus Team are testing staff and patients on wards at Hull Royal Infirmary for Hepatitis C, a potentially serious viral infection damaging the liver, as part of a global campaign to eradicate the virus.

Hepatitis C is a blood-borne virus spread through contact with infected blood from sharing needles or syringes, blood transfusions before 1996 or the reuse of un-sterilised medical equipment. The hospital team aims to raise awareness and understanding of the virus.

Day Surgery Centre at cutting edge of epilepsy management

A Hull surgeon and his team are leading the way when it comes to epilepsy management.

Neurosurgeon, Mr Adam Razak, and colleagues at Castle Hill Hospital in Cottingham are understood to be among the first in the country to conduct battery changes for vagus nerve stimulators in a dedicated day case facility.

Vagus nerve stimulation is a technique used to manage the symptoms of epilepsy in adults and children of all ages. VNS Therapy works by implanting a small device under the skin in the chest which is then connected to the left vagus nerve in the neck with a thin wire lead.

VNS Therapy delivers mild pulses to the brain through the vagus nerve to help prevent seizures before they start, and help them stop if they do. Batteries last approximately five years before they need replacing.

Nurses supporting vulnerable adults in North Lincolnshire



A new team of nurses are helping to improve vulnerable people's health and quality of life by providing vital drop-in care sessions in the community.

The Community Inclusion Team was formed to help those who don't have regular access to health services due to their circumstances, including people sleeping rough, refugees, asylum seekers, those living in temporary accommodation and members of the travelling community.

The new team was created through a partnership between district nurses at Northern Lincolnshire and Goole NHS Foundation Trust and Scunthorpe homeless charity the Forge Project. District nurses help prevent hospital admissions, and support people coming home following a hospital admission.

Two hospital units are celebrating after gaining prestigious recognition for delivering cancer care to the highest national standards.

The chemotherapy day unit and haematology day unit, which are both based at The James Cook University Hospital, retained the five-star Macmillan Quality Environment Mark (MQEM) mark, after a rigorous judging process.

The MQEM is a national award that recognises the world-class care provided to patients by hospitals and celebrates environments that provide the highest standards of cancer care.

Part of the James Cook Cancer Institute at South Tees Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, the chemotherapy day unit was commended for exceeding the level required to retain the MQEM award. The unit was applauded for bringing a number of changes that have made a positive impact on cancer patients.

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
