NHS urges public to help combat antimicrobial resistance this winter



The NHS in Humber and North Yorkshire says antibiotics are generally not the answer to treat common colds and coughs.

Winter bugs have started circulating, with many of us getting the sniffles and sneezes.

Doctors say antibiotics won't work against viral infections and say patients should not expect a prescription if they present with symptoms of a virus.

While a cold virus runs its course there are ways we can speed up our recovery or make symptoms feel less severe, such as getting plenty of bed rest, drinking lots of fluids (particularly water) and taking over-the-counter medication such as paracetamol or ibuprofen.

- Vulnerable migrants and refugees
- Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities,
- People in contact with the justice system
- Victims of modern slavery
- Sex workers
- Other marginalised groups

These groups often encounter significant barriers to accessing and navigating the healthcare system, and we need to take action to develop and improve services to meet their needs.

The Inclusion Health Community of Practice aims to connect teams and foster collaboration across the system. We offer members a platform to share successes, overcome challenges and drive meaningful change.

News from Across the Partnership

Hull leading the way in neonatal care after £1.3 million investment



Hull is leading the way nationally for neonatal care following an investment of over £1.3 million.

Physical expansion of the unit within Hull Women and Children's Hospital began in October 2023 to accommodate more intensive care and high dependency cots, improved parent and family facilities, additional equipment and a dedicated staff training suite.

Funded by a £1.2 million grant from NHS England plus local contractor donations and £100,000 from the hospital charity's "Space to Grow Appeal", the centre is now one of the leading providers of Level 3 intensive care in the country for babies as young as 22 weeks.

A new work of art created collaboratively by local artists Paul Mirfin and Andrew Copley, has been unveiled in Harrogate District Hospital's Phlebotomy department.

Both artists joined Harrogate and District NHS Foundation Trust's Chair, Sarah Armstrong, members of the Phlebotomy department and Andrew's carers – Alex Paun and Mark Boyle – for the unveiling of the original painting, which had been donated to Harrogate Hospital & Community Charity.

Paul Mirfin is a contemporary painter whose expressive oil paintings reflect his background in the railway industry, often capturing landscapes and scenery found along railway lines.

Paul was recently commissioned by David Palmer, a school friend of King Charles III, to paint a scene of Harrogate including a tree King Charles had planted. The painting is now displayed at the King's royal residence, Clarence House.

Charity shop raises thousands for cancer equipment



A charity shop has raised £20,000 to benefit patients with cancer at Grimsby's hospital.

Seaview Cancer Charity Shop in Cleethorpes raises funds for The Health Tree Foundation (HTF) – the hospital's official charity – through donations customers have made and sales made through the store.

The money will go towards equipment, which will help patients who need treatment during a very difficult time.

The shop has previously raised more than £40,000 for our hospitals. Most of this was spearheaded by the late Prue Stillings, who sadly passed away last year.

Prue worked at the store since it opened in the late 1970s. She lost various family members to cancer and had it herself three times, so wanted to give something back to patients.
