NHS opens new Mpox vaccination site in Hull

Twelve new Mpox vaccination sites have opened across England, making it easier for eligible people to get protected.

From this week, every region will be able to offer the vaccine for those at increased risk of getting the infection – after previously only being available to those eligible in London, Manchester and Brighton.

While the UK Health Security Agency has confirmed the risk from Mpox remains low, having more vaccination sites across the country will improve access to the jabs.

Mpox – previously known as monkeypox – is a rare infection most commonly found in parts of central and east Africa.

Trust GP practices receive Veteran Friendly accreditation



All three of Humber Teaching NHS Foundation Trust's GP practices have been officially recognised as Veteran Friendly under the accreditation programme run by the Royal College of General Practitioners (RCGP) and NHS England. The Trust operate Humber Primary Care in Bridlington, Kings Street Medical Centre in Cottingham and Market Weighton Group Practice.

This prestigious accreditation acknowledges a commitment to delivering the highest standard of care and treatment to patients who have served in the armed forces. It ensures that GPs are equipped with the knowledge and resources necessary to address the unique healthcare needs of veterans.

Many former service personnel experience health challenges related to their time in the military, including injuries, hearing loss, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), substance misuse, and difficulty transitioning to civilian life. Recent research highlights that many thousands of veterans are silently struggling with their health.

By achieving this accreditation, the Trust's GP practices reaffirm a dedication to identifying and supporting these individuals, ensuring they receive the best possible healthcare and guidance. As part of this initiative, the practices will continue to foster a better understanding of the needs of veterans and work closely with specialist services to provide tailored care.

All veterans registered with the practices are encouraged to inform their GP of their military service so they can receive the most appropriate support and treatment options available.

Scunthorpe nurses save lives of patient and her family



Two nurses from Scunthorpe nurses, who provide care hospital care for patients in their own homes, made a life-saving visit to a patient and her family.

Danni Parkin and Jess Bratton visited their patient, Anne Millet, after she called them to complain she was feeling weak and dizzy. It's lucky they did, as gas had been leaking into the property and both Anne and her husband were suffering from carbon monoxide poisoning.

After making sure everyone was safe, Jess and Danni also had symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning but were given the all-clear by the Emergency Department team.

Everyone, including the dog, is now fighting fit and we have also made a referral to Humberside Fire and Rescue Service for a carbon monoxide detector to be fitted in the property.

A new countryside mural is the talking point of the dementia ward in Malton. The Springwood Unit, part of Tees, Esk and Wear Valley NHS Foundation Trust, provides specialist care for people living with the condition.

Drawing on the artistic talent of Karen Wheelhouse, an activity coordinator who works at Cross Lane Hospital in Scarborough, the mural was inspired by the drive across North Yorkshire

Whilst Karen was painting, she regularly had an audience who loved to share their stories, ask questions and make suggestions – like adding windscreen wipers on to the tractor.

The mural has brightened up the night station which is used when patients need space to have a walk or therapeutic distraction and intervention. To start conversations, Karen hid small details for patients to find including snails, mice and welly-wearing chickens.
